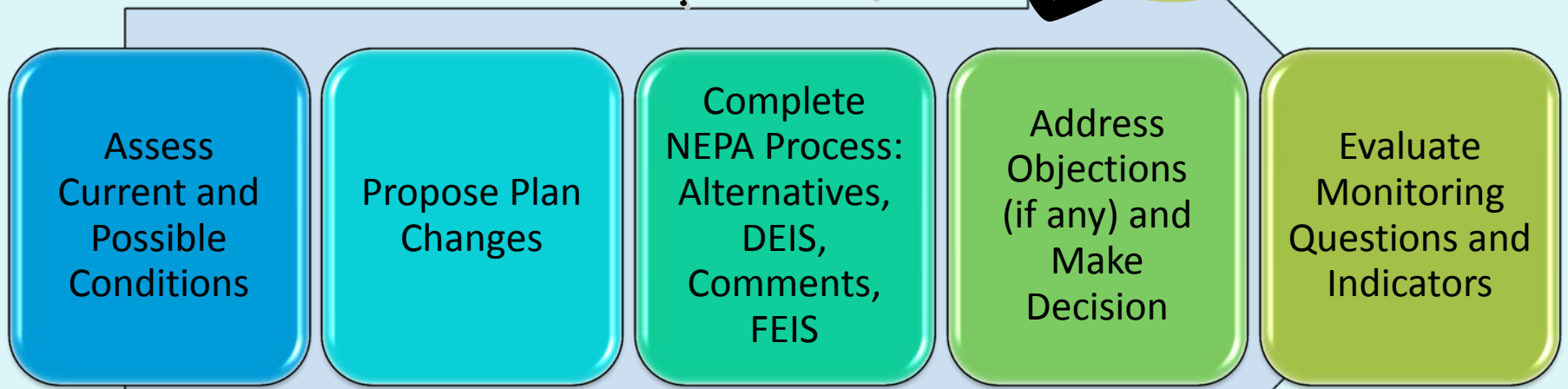


Forest Plan Revision Process

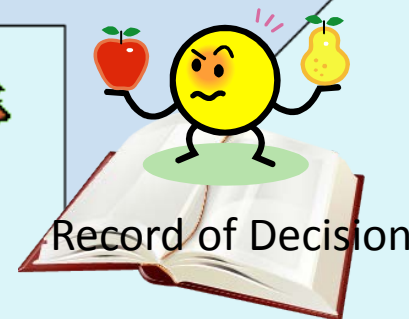

Record of Decision

Opportunities for the Public

- To *Participate* in the Assessment Process.
- To *Participate* in the Development of the Plan.
- To *Comment* on the DEIS (90-day formal period).
- To *Object* (60-day formal period).

A Forest Plan

- *Revised* Every 15 Years, *Amended* if Needed.
- Provides Broad Strategic Direction.
- Does Not Authorize any Action or Compel any Use.
- Instead, it Guides Future Decisions for Projects (Like a Timber Sale) or Activities (Like Travel Management).

Content of a Forest Plan

- Plan Components (Only Changed with Future Amendments, if needed).
- Other Content (Changed with Future Correction, if needed).

Plan Components

- **Goals** (Optional).
- **Desired Conditions** – Description of what we want on the ground.
- **Objectives** – Time specific and measurable outcomes on the ground.
- **Suitability** – Timber, Grazing, Travel, etc.
- **Standards** – Every project must comply.
- **Guidelines** – Projects may deviate but still meet the overall intent.

Plan Components

(Goals, Desired Conditions, Objectives, Standards, Guidelines, Suitability)

- Forest-Wide.
- Geographic Area Specific (Zone or District).
- Management Area Specific (Spread Across the Forest with a Common Theme).

Examples of Desired Conditions and Objectives from Current Plan

Desired Conditions

- *Fish thrive in Forest lakes and streams due to adequate habitat and water quality (**Forest-wide**).*
- **For the Scenic Byways Management Area 4.21,** *feature high-quality scenery, and developments in harmony with the natural environment.*

Objectives

- *Within the life of the plan, construct 30 miles of trails (**Forest-wide**).*
- *Over a 10 year period, complete 12,000 acres of fuels treatment (**Forest-wide**).*

Examples of Standards and Guidelines from Current Plan

Standards

- *Restrict human activities within one mile of a peregrine falcon nest site between February 1 and August 31. (Forest-wide)*
- **For Backcountry Management Area 3.3, ATV game retrieval off designated trails is prohibited.**

Guidelines

- **For Research Natural Areas (Management Area 2.2) where feasible, use natural barriers to confine or contain fire.**

Other Plan Content

- Roles and Contributions – in the larger landscape.
- Management Approaches – “How to’s”.
- Coordination – Who we coordinate with.
- Priority Watersheds Restoration Needs.
- Proposed and Possible Actions.
- Monitoring Program (Questions and Indicators).

Key Requirements for Forest Plans

- ***Ecological integrity*** for terrestrial, aquatic ecosystems and watersheds.
- Air, soil, water, and riparian protection.
- Additional species-specific requirements.
- Integrated resource management for ***multiple use*** and ***ecosystem services***.
- Sustainable recreation, cultural, historic, tribal, and Special Areas.

Forest Plan Revision Process
